Digital Depositories: Navigating resources to locate archival & special collection images is an RCLS and OLA (Orange Library Association) collaborative program that will be presented **Friday, April 20** from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. at the Moffat Library of Washingtonville.

The session will help attendees to better serve patrons in locating archival and special collections resources and familiarize them with the navigation of these digital repositories. The presentation will begin by looking at digital collections and digital repositories: What they are and how they can be advantageous for end users. Also included will be advice on how to use metadata as a means of navigation and how to determine copyright and re-use status of resources.

Presenter Jennifer Palmentiero is the Digital Services Librarian at Southeastern New York Library Resources Council (SENYLRC) where she administers the Council's digitalization service and the <u>Hudson River Valley Heritage</u> <u>website</u>. Jennifer provides training and support to member organizations on all aspects of the digitalization process including project planning, scanning metadata and copyright considerations for all digital projects.

- Vancouver reverses policy on naloxone use | Global News BC3.23.18 Vancouver (B.C.) Public Library staff will now be allowed to respond to overdoses inside their buildings, as long as they are trained to do so, the city confirmed on March 23. The move is a reversal of a previous policy that directed library and other publicfacility staff in the city not to intervene or administer naloxone. Vancouver city manager Sadhu Johnston said the change marks a shift away from the city's reliance on front-line staff and first responders, who until now had been the only ones allowed to administer the opioid-blocking medication.

Big Federal Funding Increases for Libraries

AL: The Scoop, Mar. 23 Congress has passed, and President Trump has signed, an FY2018 omnibus spending bill on March 23 that includes significant federal funding increases for our nation's libraries. One year ago, the White House proposed eliminating the Institute of Museum and Library Services and slashed millions of dollars in federal funding for libraries. Twelve months and tireless advocacy efforts later, ALA advocates have helped libraries: win \$9 million more for IMLS than it had in FY 2017, including \$5.7 million for the Library Services and Technology Act; restore \$27 million for the Innovative Approaches to Literacy program; and provide \$350 million for the Public Service Loan Forgiveness program. Congress has also appropriated an unexpected \$700 million for Title IV education programs, which opens doors to new funding for school libraries. And Congressional Research Service (CRS) reports will now be published online by the Library of Congress, ensuring for the first time permanent public access to valuable government information.
