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Advocacy Works!

The 2018-2019 New York State Budget includes restoration of the \$4 million of funds that Governor Cuomo proposed cutting from State Aid to libraries and library systems. In addition, the legislators increased State Aid by \$1 million, the first system aid increase since 2016. Total State Library Aid will be \$96.6 million.

Thank YOU!

The legislators also restored the funds the Governor proposed cutting from the State Public Library Construction Aid program and added an additional \$10 million bringing the Grant program funding to \$34 million (\$10 million higher than last year).


From Awareness to Funding 2018

OCLC has partnered with the American Library Association (ALA) and its Public Library Association (PLA) division to investigate current perceptions and support among US voters and how they may have shifted since 2008 when OCLC published *From Awareness to Funding: A Study of Library Support in America*, a national study of the awareness, attitudes, and underlying motivations among US voters for supporting library funding.

Key Findings:

- A majority of US voters believe public libraries are essential to communities and a source of civic pride.
- Voters still highly value traditional library services such as free access to books and quiet areas, but also increasingly value the library as a community hub.
- A disconnect continues between the services libraries offer and public awareness and support for those services.
- Although a majority of voters are likely to support library funding at the local ballot box, fewer are committed to definite support than a decade ago.
- A majority of voters still do not realize that the primary source of library funding is local.

Sarah Northshield Wins NYLA YSS Pied Piper Award

At the New York Library Association (NYLA) Youth Services Section (YSS) Spring Conference in Syracuse this week, Sarah Northshield, a children's librarian at the Pearl River Public Library will be honored with YSS Pied Piper Award for her Codergarten program. The program grew from a successful and popular coding program that Sarah conducts at the library's Learning Lab, a multimedia space within the library. The 40-minute programs are for children from third grade and up, and are open to adults as well. The sessions are held weekly for three weeks.

Basic coding concepts are taught without the use of electronic devices with the intent that the models could be implemented by other libraries, daycare centers and preschools with minimal to no cost using materials that they might already have on-hand. From this program, the award-winning Codergarten was born.

Codergarten is designed for children ages four and five, not yet in Kindergarten, with an adult caregiver. This program is limited to 10 children (plus caregivers).

Over the three-week session, the children were able to complete and understand the concepts taught through the activities, use concepts from previous sessions' activities and build on them during successive activities. Adult caregivers reported their child continued to play with the materials at home.

Both children and their grownups were excited about the novelty of the program, said that they had learned a lot, and overall had a fun time.

Because of the program's success, the library will offer additional Codergarten sessions.

Established in 1982, the YSS Pied Piper Award recognizes excellence in the creation of an individual program that promotes service to the young people of New York State Libraries and is able to be replicated at other libraries. Submissions are judged on originality, program implementation, program content, and marketing of said program.
