[SEAL \(SouthEastern Access to Libraries\)](#) is Southeastern New York Library Resources Council (SENYLRC)'s resource sharing platform. It connects libraries of all types in the Southeastern NY region – encompassing Columbia, Dutchess, Greene, Orange, Putnam, Rockland, Sullivan, and Ulster counties – and allows them to easily share books, DVDs, and other resources.



SENYLRC has announced that the New York State Library is joining SEAL. The State Library is a fantastic resource for materials, particularly academic books.

A [libguide](#) is available for current or interested SEAL users. It includes training materials such as the SEAL manual, tutorial videos, and answers to frequently asked questions. 


How to be a Good Library Patron

Public Libraries and Bike-sharing Programs

Wilson Chapman writes, “Across the US, more than 20 public libraries have [introduced](#) special bike-share programs, in which members take out bicycles from the library for free before returning them at the end of the day. The initiatives are often done in partnership with city public health departments to help promote health and exercise among community members. In May, the public library system in [Lorain, Ohio](#), became one of the latest to launch a bike-share program. Ohio has the most public libraries with bike-share programs in the US, with at least eight towns being served.”



Fall River Library Shares Bicycles

As regional planning officials work to attract the kinds of bike share companies that have thrived in larger cities such as Boston and Providence in recent years, Fall River (Mass.) Public Library has set a plan of its own in motion. Two bikes and a bike rack have been parked in the building’s lobby for the last month, waiting for anyone with a library card and a place to go. City residents can check out each bike for a week at a time and, unlike most bike-shares, it’s free of charge. Originally donated to Government Center as part of the state’s [Mass in Motion](#) initiative, the bikes were transferred to the library this spring.
